By comparing our historical trajectories and present realities, we can learn a great deal from the diverse responses being given to the major challenges ahead.

The debate between us gave shape to four thematic axes that will be reflected in the different panels of the congress: Relations between Latin America and Asia-Oceania in a Changing World Order; Comparative Studies between Latin America and Asia-Oceania; Intellectual Encounters between Latin America and Asia-Oceania and, last but not least. Migration, the Diaspora and Transnational Communities.

We invite you to participate in the culmination of this collective effort, marked by the opening of this unique space for the rigorous exchange of knowledge between continents that approach one another with curiosity, interest, and shared goals. We believe that it will be an invaluable experience and hopefully a pathway toward new opportunities for research collaboration and engagement.

The State of Asia–Oceania Latin American Studies: Mapping Knowledge, Connections, and Emerging Agendas

This roundtable examines the evolving field of Asia–Oceania Latin American studies through an interdisciplinary and comparative lens. It highlights the role of scholarly communities in consolidating a body of knowledge that spans economics, politics, migration, and comparative authoritarianism.

Bringing together both senior and emerging voices, the discussion will first consider bibliometric evidence of the field's growth. My mother used to tell me that our dining table was as old as I am. I wonder how old the tree was when it was cut down to be turned into our table. I am fascinated by this kind of transmutation from the natural world to the human one, and how a tree takes on new lives long after it has been cut down. This short film essay incorporates archival photographs from the American Colonial Era in the Philippines (1898–1946) to explore the sticky relationship between humans and nature and the entanglements of both with Empire. Taking plants and trees as starting points, it aims to reflect on the intertwined roots of photography and capitalism in the Philippines.

The film traces over sixty years of Yasuo Inomata's work, Argentina's most important landscape artist, creator of the Japanese gardens in Buenos Aires, and a key figure within the Japanese community in Argentina. Yasuo Inomata was born in a village in northern Japan and settled in Escobar, a town near Argentina's capital, in the 1960s. Starting in Escobar, the film retraces Inomata's career and reaches Japan, the city of Tokyo, and the town of Kamaishi, where Inomata was born. Margarita Lopez Maya

Margarita López Maya, holds a degree in history and a PhD in Social Sciences from the Central University of Venezuela. Professor Emeritus of the Center for Development Studies (CENDES) of the UCV. She was director of the Venezuelan Journal of Economics and Social Sciences, a member of the Executive Committee of the Latin American Council of Social Sciences (CLACSO), president of the Venezuelan Studies Section of the Latin American Studies Association, member of the Center for Political Studies of the UCAB and president of the Latin American Studies Association 2022-2023.

Raul Sanchez Urribarri

Dr. Raul Sanchez Urribarri is Associate Dean (Academic and International Partnerships) at the School of Humanities and Social Sciences, and Associate Professor of Crime, Justice and Legal Studies at the Department of Social Inquiry, La Trobe University. He holds a PhD in Political Science from the University of South Carolina, a Master of Laws (LLM) from Cambridge University and a Law degree from Universidad Católica Andrés Bello (Caracas, Venezuela). His research focuses on constitutionalism, judicial politics, and the rule of law in comparative perspective. His work includes three recent books (co-edited): *Judicial Activism in Comparative Perspective* (Peter Lang); *Informality and Courts* (Edinburgh University Press), and *Authoritarian Consolidation in Times of Crisis* (Routledge). He is past Chair of LASA's Section on Venezuelan Studies and the Political Institutions Section.

Vladimir Rouvinski

El Dr. Vladimir Rouvinski es profesor titular del Departamento de Estudios Políticos y director del Laboratorio de Política y Relaciones Internacionales (PoInt) de la Universidad Icesi de Cali, Colombia, además de coordinar el Programa de Estudios de la Alianza del Pacífico (PEAP) de la misma universidad. Es graduado de la Universidad Estatal de Irkutsk de la carrera de historia y relaciones internacionales. Adicionalmente, cuenta con una Maestría y Doctorado en Desarrollo y Cooperación Internacional de la Universidad de Hiroshima (Japón) y con los estudios posdoctorales en el Instituto de la Ciencia para la Paz en Hiroshima.

El área principal de experticia de Vladimir son las relaciones de Asia y Rusia con América Latina y el Caribe y es copresidente de la Sección de Asia y las Américas de la Asociación de Estudios Latinoamericanos (LASA). Antes de unirse a la Universidad Icesi en 2007, Vladimir trabajó con instituciones educativas, de investigación y organismos multilaterales en Japón y Colombia. También ocupó puestos de investigación en el Centro Internacional para Investigadores Woodrow Wilson en Washington, DC, el Instituto Georg Eckert en Braunschweig, Alemania, y la Universidad Internacional de Florida, y ha sido el profesor visitante de la Universidad de Hokkaido.

Entre sus más recién libros se encuentran *“Tejiendo historias: relatos de la diáspora japonesa en Colombia”* (GEUP, 2024), *“Repensar las relaciones ruso-latinoamericanas posteriores a la Guerra Fría”* (Routledge, 2022) y *“Entre Este y Oeste. Estado, Nación y Conflicto en la Ucrania contemporánea”* (Tirant lo Blanch, 2022).

Dr. Vladimir Rouvinski is a professor in the Department of Political Studies and director of the Laboratory for Politics and International Relations Laboratory (PoInt) at the Icesi University in Cali, Colombia. He also coordinates the same university's Pacific Alliance Studies Program (PEAP). Vladimir graduated from the Irkutsk State University with a history and international relations degree. Additionally, he has a Master's and Doctorate in Development and International Cooperation from Hiroshima University (Japan) and postdoctoral studies at the Institute for Peace Science in Hiroshima.

Vladimir's main area of expertise is Asian and Russian relations with Latin America and the Caribbean. He is Co-Chair of the Latin American Studies Association (LASA) Asia and Americas Section. Before joining Icesi University in 2007, Vladimir worked with educational institutions, research institutions, and multilateral organizations in Japan and Colombia. He has also held research positions at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Researchers in Washington, DC, the Georg Eckert Institute in Braunschweig, Germany, Florida International University, and University of Hokkaido.

Among his most recent books are *“Tejiendo historias: relatos de la diáspora japonesa en Colombia”* (GEUP, 2024); *“Rethinking Post-Soviet Russian-Latin American Relations”* (Routledge, 2022) and *“Between East and West. State, Nation, and Conflict in Contemporary Ukraine”* (Tirant lo Blanch, 2022).

Coordinating Team Bios

Nobuaki Hamaguchi

Nobuaki Hamaguchi is a Professor at the Research Institute for Economics and Business Administration (RIEB), Kobe University. He holds a Ph.D. in Regional Science from the University of Pennsylvania. An economist specializing in Brazil, his research focuses on spatial and development economics.

He has co-authored several notable works, including *Cutting the Distance: Benefits and Tensions from the Recent Active Engagement of China, Japan, and Korea in Latin America* (2018), *Innovation with Spatial Impact: Sustainable Development of the Brazilian Cerrado* (2019), *Spatial Economics for Building Back Better: The Japanese Experience* (2021), and *Brazil—Japan Cooperation: From Complementarity to Shared Value* (2023).

Professor Hamaguchi also serves in various public and academic roles, including as a member of the Industrial Structure Council of Japan's Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry (METI); Program Director for Regional Economy and Faculty Fellow at the Research Institute of Economy, Trade and Industry (RIETI); member of the Science Council of Japan; Vice-Chairman of the Japan Association of Latin America and the Caribbean (JALAC); and President of the Japan Society of Social Science on Latin America (JSLA).

Timothy Power

Timothy Power is Professor of Latin American Politics and Head of the Social Sciences Division at the University of Oxford. He is a comparative political scientist with a deep commitment to interdisciplinary area studies. Tim has held several leadership roles within LASA, including Treasurer, Member of the Strategic Planning Committee, Member of the Investment Advisory Committee, and Program Co-Chair for the LASA International Congress. From 2008 to 2012 he directed the Latin American Centre at Oxford, and served as Head of the Oxford School of Global and Area Studies (OSGA) from 2018-2021. His research concerns democratization and political institutions (parties, legislatures, and elections) in modern Latin America, especially Brazil.

Manuel Roman Lacayo

Manuel Román Lacayo, PhD, *Latin American Studies Association (LASA) Deputy Director*. Manuel has more than 25 years' experience working in academia, government, and the private sector. He was the recipient of a Fulbright Research Fellowship upon graduating from Harvard University. He earned a PhD in anthropology at the University of Pittsburgh, under the auspices of the Heinz Fellowship in Latin American Archaeology Heinz Fellow. In his professional life, Manuel has served as Director of the National Museum of Nicaragua, Country Program Manager and Monitoring and Evaluation Manager for USAID Public Private Partnerships in Nicaragua and Guatemala, as well as Associate Director for the Center for Latin American Studies at the University of Pittsburgh. He also founded and coordinated the master's program in Latin American Studies at the Universidad Americana in Managua.

Prior to his return to Pittsburgh in 2019, he spent five years in Washington, D.C., serving as a project manager, and cultural heritage, environmental and social consultant for projects located in Latin America and the Caribbean.

Paz Milet
